# AHEPA 38TH BIENNIAL BANQUET ENORMOUS SUCCESS

# Capitol Hill Day, Meetings with Members of Congress Well Received

ASHINGTON, D.C. - The American Hellenic Educational Progressive Association (AHEPA), the leading association for the nation's 1.4 million American citizens of Greek an-

cestry, and Philhellenes, welcomed a capacity crowd at its 38th Biennial Salute Banquet, honoring those in public service, on Friday, March 7.

AHEPA honored over 30 legislators from state and national government, with the AHEPA Public Service Award. "Everyday public servants sacrifice their time and energy to ensure our rights, issues and causes are represented across our nation," said AHEPA Supreme President Ike Gulas. "We are fortunate to be given an opportunity to say 'thank you,' present them with a certificate of appreciation and offer AHEPA's grassroots network to help champion our respective issues of concern."

This year, AHEPA awarded the Demosthenes Award to George Bistis, Chief, Voice of America Greek Desk. Born in Cyprus and raised in Greece, Mr. Bistis joined VOA in 1967. He is well known in the journalistic field, having produced and presented more than 500 television shows and over 75,000 radio shows. Among his observations, Mr. Bistis spoke poignantly of his coverage after the 9/11 attacks, which claimed among the thousands of victims over 30 Greek Americans. He cited the inspiration of Archbishop Demetrios moving among the rubble with the recovery workers.

The Aristotle Award awarded to John Catsimatides, Chairman and CEO, Red Apple Group, Inc. To cheers from the crowd and shouts of "next Mayor of New York", Mr. Catsimatides, born in Greece, briefly described his and his family's background. He credited his father's hard work and sacrifices providing him the opportunity to receive an education and

achieve business success. Mr. Catsimatides owns a number of enterprises, including Gristedes Supermarkets, United Refining Company, Red Apple Real Estate Development Company, and Red Apple aviation which operates a small fleet of corporate aircraft.

Additional speakers included President Gulas; Daughters of Penelope Grand President Karen Stamatiades; Former Foreign Minister of Cyprus Erato Kozakou Marcoullis; Ambassadors Andreas Kakouris, Cyprus and Alexandros Mallias, Hellenic Republic; U.S. Representative John Sarbanes (D-MD-3); His Eminence Archbishop Demetrios and our Emcee for the evening, U.S. Representative Zachary Space (D-OH-18).

Archbishop Demetrios addressed the banquet with his usual incite and inspiration. At one point, he seemingly went on a tangent to describe the impact of the Greek language on modern English using the word "phoni" (voice) as an example. He begins to gesture around the room demonstrating how the word has permeated our lives ("microphone, megaphone"), and then reaches into his robe a pulls out "the ultimate example, the 'I-phone'"! Congressman Sarbanes was moved to

comment on the visual impact of the Archbishop showing his I-phone.

"Our evening was a success and I would like to thank Rep. Space for his excellent service as Emcee for the evening," added Gulas. "It was a long night, full of surprises and Rep. Space helped keep the evening on track."

Supreme President Gulas addressed the attendees of the banquet on the issues AHEPA has been educating members of the 110th Congress about, such as the Visa Waiver Program, Cyprus unification and Turkish troop withdrawal, the Greek Fires, FYROM and the Ecumenical Patriarch and Patriarchate.

The Supreme President challenged the attendees during the banquet, "we can do more," he said, an important and inspired statement addressing the standing room only crowd on AHEPA's achievements over the past 86 years and for the continued dedication to the associations' goals.

### SUPREME AND GRAND LODGE ATTENDS LARGEST EPIPHANY CELEBRATION IN THE WESTERN HEMISPHERE







Among the initiatives we thanked him for was his joining the Congressional Hellenic Caucus, and his cosponsoring a bill, the "American-Owned Property in Occupied Cyprus Claims Act" (H.R.1456), which will provide our Americans the right to sue Turkey in US Federal Courts for compensation for their property in occupied Cyprus. In response to a question from Congressman Garrett, we informed him that several people in our community would directly benefit from this bill.

Our meeting with Congressman Garrett, hosted by Steven Sedereas of the Suburban Diner in Paramus, NJ, covered a host of issues starting with the unmet promises by Turkey to respect the human rights of its Christian minority population. We described several troubling incidents over the past year in Turkey, including a Catholic priest shot dead by a teenager and an Armenian Christian journalist killed by a gunman. We also shared with the Congressman news reports of attacks against churches. One egregious incident was the forestry service on the Island of Chalki attempting to demolish the Christ the Saviour Monastery. Finally,



we reviewed the stalemate with Turkey over its closing of the Theological Seminary and the government's refusal to allow it to function, denying the Orthodox Christian community in Turkey a source of trained priests and hampering the worldwide administration of the Patriarchate. Churches throughout Turkey, of every denomination, are crumbling because Turkey prohibits maintenance work without government approvals, which are rarely forthcoming.



# A TRIP TO THE PAST



### 75 YEARS OF CAMDEN CHAPTER No. 69

amden Chapter No.69 was organized on June 4,1925. Thirty six members were installed that evening. There was such great enthusiasm generated about this new organization, that by the year's end, this thirty six had increased to sixty.

For many years, our Chapter did not have permanent quarters. In 1947, out of the Camden Chapter, grew an organization named "American Hellenic Orthodox Centre". All their elected of Beers were Ahepans. A building was purchased in 1954 by the American Hellenic Orthodox Centre in Camden, where the Ahepa was given the second "floor for aineeting room and the third floor for the Greek language school. Some years later, the Greek Orthodox Church of Camden County was established and from this came the St. Thomas Greek Orthodox Church. The ground on which our Church and Cultural Center are built was purchased by The American Hellenic Orthodox Centre, whose leaders had the foresight to realize, that for us to grow, we needed room. The building in Camden was sold to the city renewal program, and the proceeds donated towards the erection of our Church and Hellenic Cultural Center. In the Hellenic Cultural Center, we have one of, if not the finest, Ahepa meeting room in all the Ahepa domain.

The name "American Hellenic Educational Progressive Association" emphasizes education. It is not education as we think of it today, such as high school and college, but rather education about the laws that govern the new country to which the Greeks emigrated. In accordance with the oath and obligation taken as candidates-for membership, our chapter instructed them in how to apply for citizenship. The Chapter also realized that the Greek language and heritage needed to be preserved. In 1929,-the chapter established a Greek evening school. From that meager beginning, we now boast of having one of the finest Greek language schools in the Delaware Valley area and beyond. Each year, we present the "Ahepa Medal for Scholarship Excellence" to the outstanding student in our Greek language school.

Higher education is also of high importance to our Chapter . In 1965 one of our members established our first Scholarship Fund. Other scholarships have since been established by families of some of our deceased members. Our scholarship funds have given grants totaling \$46,300.00 to date.

At the District level four of our members distinguished themselves by becoming District Governors. Our chapter has hosted five successful district conventions (\*48,'58,'67,'.75,'89) in addition to this year's convention. One of our members was instrumental in establishing the Ahe-

pa Fifth District Cancer Research Foundation. This foundation raises funds which are donated to be used for cancer research in the hope that some day a cure can be found to eradicate this disease.

Our chapter has hosted many benefit dances, with all proceeds going to different charitable organizations. It hosted dances to benefit 5th District Cancer Research Foundation, Deborah Hospital, Cooley's Anemia, and the purchase of a pulse oximeter that is located in the neonatal nursery of the West Jersey Hospital. (This is a care center where the new born child is examined by the surgeon.) Our chapter supported the Cyprus Relief Fund and, for several years, adopted a Greek Cypriot refugee.

Annually, we host dinner meetings honoring our "Old Timers" and the "Past Presidents" of our chapter. Each year, we conduct a memorial service for our deceased members. In the year 1975, we celebrated the chapter's 50th Anniversary, where we honored the surviving charter members, with Senator Paul Saibanes astoastmaster. In early years, our chapter had an excellent degree team. This biography has only touched the surface of our history. Past records will prove that the Camden Chapter No. 69 of the Order of Ahepa will endure and become stronger with age. Its future will be as bright as its past.
