








eter (Petros) Leonidas Tsirigotis, an Ahepan from the Thomas Jefferson chapter #280, Westfield, has published a new book that is now available on Amazon.com. It is titled, "Developing Body, Mind, and Spirit: A Parents Guide to Martial Arts Training for Kids." The book is an inexpensive paperback at \$12.99. It is an easy read at approximately 80 pages.

# JOHN VITTAS DESCRIBES HIS EXPERIENCE AS A STUDENT IN AHEPA ACADEMY

My dear AHEPA family,

Getting the opportunity to attend AHEPAcademy this June was a tremendous experience for me. Based at George Mason University in Fairfax, Virginia, myself along with nine other Greek American seniors enjoyed a jam-packed week of learning and fun. The educational aspects of AHEPAcademy included lectures from five very accomplished Greek Americans, two of whom have recently published autobiographies. Director of the program and lawyer, Aris Chronis, led a networking seminar and etiquette lessons, preparing us for job interviews and giving us tips for building connections in a social environment. Our group also had the privilege to visit the Greek and Cypriot embassies, where we were briefed on current issues facing each nation and given time to ask questions to the respective ambassadors. The educational part of the trip wrapped up with a formal dinner with many important guests, the type of setting we had been training to interact in. Aris' outstanding staff also included two women, Maria Achilleos and Demitra Sourlis, both of whom offered insight and testimony to what we were learning.

Being in the Washington DC area, we toured all of the monuments, visited the Smithsonian museums and received an inside tour of the US Capitol Building. We also spent a day in Baltimore, where we visited the Baltimore aquarium, science center and mall, all within the inner harbor. The night was capped off with an Orioles baseball game at Camden Yards. Back at the dorms, we took part in organized discussions about being Greek teenagers in today's society and reviewed each day during our nightly "de-briefs" in the dorm lounge. The experience overall was very enriching as I gained a better of understanding of how our government functions as well as how to compose myself and be successful in the business world. Meeting and relating to other Greek teens of the same age from across the country was also an important part of the trip, as I got to build connections and make new friends. 

Raised in Philadelphia, PA, he later returned to Kinston to enjoy his retirement. Mr. West was a member of Camden Chapter #69 Order of AHEPA of Cherry Hill, NJ, where he served as President for two years. He went on to become District Governor and founded the Fifth District Cancer Research Foundation. He was appointed a "Kentucky Colonel" by the Governor of Kentucky. He was always quick with a joke and left you smiling. He was loved by all and will be truly missed. Survivors include his wife of 60 years, Mabel "May" Brown West of the home and many other special nieces, nephews, and other loving family members and friends. Funeral services were held at 7:00 p.m. Friday, May 7, 2010 at Howard-Carter Funeral Home with Reverend Rick Vernon officiating. The family honored Woody's great legacy as founder of the Fifth District Cancer Research Foundation with an Ahepa service in New Jersey prior to his funeral which was on Monday, May 10, 2010 at Stephenson-Brown Funeral Home in Merchantville, NJ. There were many Ahepans in attendance. In lieu of flowers, the family requested that memorials be made to the 5th District Cancer Research Foundation, Box 481, Edison, NJ 08817.

Chris Sevast, a lifelong friend, fellow Camden Chapter member and treasurer to the Fifth District Cancer Research Foundation Board for many years stated "you could see that his family knew of the importance of the Fifth District Cancer Research Foundation to Woody. Even the memorial offerings have been designated to this noblest of causes. That was Woody to the end. His legacy, of philanthropy, kindness and wisdom will live on forever through this great Ahepa institution that was his brainchild. There is no greater legacy than to help your fellow man for years to come through the Fifth District Cancer Research Foundation. Although he was not Greek he truly was a Philhellene. When he first started off in our chapter he

would always be involved on every committee, chaired district conventions, raised scholarship monies, helped refurbish our Ahepa Hall which is one of the finest Ahepa halls, if not the finest, in the coun-



Lee Millas, member of Ahepa National Board of Trustees, from Trenton, NJ, stated "there has never been a more dedicated member of Ahepa. The fact that he wasn't even Greek shows how amazing Woody truly was. He was dedicated not just to Ahepa taking a leadership role in cancer research, but he was dedicated to the cause of humanity. What made him a great person was what made him a great Ahepan. The Cancer Research Foundation of the 5th District was truly one of the greatest accomplishments in the history of Ahepa and one of the greatest accomplishments throughout all of the Ahepa domain."

Andrew Zachariades, the current chair of the Ahepa Fifth District Cancer Research Foundation, issued a statement on behalf of the Foundation board, stating "His vision of creating a foundation was extraordinary. This program was started in 1988. The first institute to receive a grant was Fox Chase. To date we have given over \$700,000 to various research institutes including Fox Chase, The Cancer Institute of New Jersey, and Sloan Kettering just to name a few. Every year we have a Cancer Research Gala that is our major fundraiser. This year it will be held once again on November 13, 2010 at the Pines Manor in Edison, NJ. It is with a heavy heart that we will have the gala this year but Woody would want it no other way. In fact, he would want us to celebrate his life and raise monies for this cause while doing so. He was the founder of this great institution and he would want it to succeed. On behalf of the Board of Trustees, we have lost our voice but will proceed in the battle against this horrible disease. May his memory be eternal and everlasting."

## Hellenic History Tournament Set for Saturday, November 20th

ne of the new programs from the Order of AHEPA is the Hellenic History Tournament. At the Montreal convention it was adopted by the the AHEPA Cultural Commission as a national project. It is a competition for high school students who would like to learn more about the 3500-year-long history of the Hellenes.

Tournament champions receive significant monetary scholarship awards. Contestants form their own 3-member teams and invent team names to generate a little excitement. Each team is sponsored by a local AHEPA chapter. Each contestant receives a copy of "Hellenika, Heritage and History" by T. Peter Limber, which is the book used as a basis for most of the competition's questions. Contestants have the summer to study the book. When students show up at the Tournament, they also receive a polo shirt with the Hellenic History logo. All in all, a price performer for their \$25 registration fee. Team sponsorship is approximately \$375. As of this writing, 16 teams were registered for the competition.

The actual tournament takes place on Saturday November 20th at the St Barbara Greek Orthodox Church, Orange, CT. Each match pits two three-student teams against each other. During the match, each team takes turns selecting one of three historical periods: Ancient, Roman/Byzantine, or Ottoman/Modern. Once the period is selected, a question from that period and four multiple choice answers are projected onto a big screen from a computer monitor. Questions are read and answers confirmed and recorded by adult moderators during the match. There is no penalty for incorrect answers, except that the opposing team can then select from the remaining three answers. The computer keeps a running log of each team's score. It is a single elimination tournament, so teams compete in successive matches until they lose a match. Eventually, the competition culminates in a final match between the two remaining teams. At the end of the final match, the winners are awarded a \$1,000 prize and a Hellenic History Trophy each. The second place winners each receive \$500.

The AHEPA chapter that sponsors the winning team receives the Hellenic History Trophy cup, which is inscribed with the chapter's name and number. They get to keep it for the year.



## THE 88TH AHEPA SUPREME CONVENTION

## Montreal, Québec host this year's convention

unday, July 18, 2010 - The 88th AHEPA Supreme Convention was completed today in the city of Montreal, Quebec, Canada. Over 200 AHEPA delegates attended the convention which began Monday, July 12that the Delta Centre-Ville hotel. The convention was held for the second time ever in the city of Montreal, the other time being in 1960, 50 years ago.

The convention resulted in the re-election of Nick Karacostas of Flushing, NY as Supreme President. The top offices of the Supreme Lodge were unchanged as all incumbents ran for re-election and won. Thanks to a last minute agreement between the two AHEPA political parties, AHEPA First and the New Horizons, all positions were uncontested, except for the office of Supreme Secretary, where two AHEPA First candidates from Texas competed. Re-elected were Dr. John Grossomanides of Rhode Island as Supreme Vice President, Anthony Kouzounis of Houston, TX was reelected as Supreme Secretary, retired Colonel Nick Vamvakias of Fairfax, VA was re-elected as Supreme Treasurer, Spiro Siaggas of Duluth, GA was re-elected as Supreme Athletic Director. The Supreme Governor election resulted in our own Andy Zachariades of Brick, NJ being elected as Supreme Governor of Region 3 (NY, NJ & DE). Other Supreme Governors will be announced by AHEPA Headquarters. Vassos Chrysanthou of Toms River, NJ will join the Board of Trustees as he will fill one of two vacancies on the Board of Trustees, the body which manages AHEPA's finances.

All Legislation on the ballot passed. Most legislation was procedural, having to do with the selection of the Board of Trustees or selection and management of the Supreme Convention. One item on the ballot lowered the age of dual membership for a Son of Pericles into AHEPA from 21 to 18. Another item, expanded the AHEPA domain to "worldwide" as AHEPA seeks to possibly expand to new areas of the globe. Another item removed the use of the mission Vice President titles for the Supreme Lodge only, resulting in only one Vice Presidential office.

The remainder of the Convention was very successful. Committee reports spoke of the innovative programs being worked on by the AHEPA family to further the purposes of Hellenism, Education, Philanthropy, Civic Responsibility, family and individual

excellence. Some of the highlights are:

The Hellenic Cultural Committee will establish a regional competition for the youth in Hellenic studies.

The Athletics Department will be part of a classical marathon in Athens, Greece in October 31. There is space for up to 300 athletes running under AHEPA's name. So far as many as 100 spots have been filled.

The formation of an AHEPA Political Action Committee (PAC), a separate corporation, that will work to raise money and promote political candidates who are for Hellenic related issues.

The adoption as a national project is the building of a Hellenic Museum in Chicago, IL. The building of which has already begun.

The continuation of regional banquets to honor Hellenes and phil-Hellenes for their contributions to public service.

The announcement of 3 new AHEPA housing projects being funded by HUD. After completion, over 5,000 seniors will be living in AHEPA housing buildings.

An increase in overall membership to surpass the 16,000 member mark

As for the Junior Orders, the Sons of Pericles and Maids of Athena, there was much good news to report as well. The Sons realized a sharp increase in membership under the leadership of our own, Supreme President, Dean Tselepis. District 5 was named by the Supreme Lodge as the "District of the Year", after doubling the number of active chapters from 3 to 6. District 5 Advisor to the Sons, Ted Vittas, was inducted into the Sons of Pericles "Wall of Honor" which is at AHEPA Headquarters, this for his work as a District Advisor. Haralambos Tsivicos of Asbury Park completed a successful fund drive as National Chairman of the Sons charitable projects, ALS (Lou Gehrig's disease) and the Cyprus Children's Fund. A special honoree of the Sons was a 97 year old Life Member who joined the Worchester, MA chapter in 1926, the year the Sons were founded.



This year the Maids chose for their national project, St Basil's Academy in Garrison, NY. Assisting the Maids of Athena as National Advisor is our own Demi Thomas of Ridgewood, NJ.

At the Supreme Convention an AHEPA Membership Symposium was held. The symposium recognized six chapters: Denver #145, Stamford #99, Paramus #54, New Rochelle #405, Merrillville #78, and Brooklyn, NY #41 were all invited based on their successful membership programs. A panelist format was implemented to foster communication about improving membership recruitment. The Supreme Vice President Dr. John Grossomanides was the moderator and facilitated questions from the audience. The Paramus #54 awarded the first place award for the most initiates in the large division (over 101 members) and the Asbury Park #287 the second place in the small division (under 50 members).

Other events at the convention included a symposium on Greek issues such as Macedonia and Cypurs. Several lectures were held by published authors and experts in the fields of medicine and Hellenic studies, A classical music concert was hosted by the Daughters of Penelope. Stand up comic Angelo Tsarouhas performed in a fund raiser for the Sons of Pericles. There were several vendors selling unique products such as foods, books, furs and more. Evening events included a casino night and an off-site barbeque.



# AHEPA 2010 Journey to Greec

In 1968 the Order of AHEPA embarked a new journey which would take our youth to Greece for an educational and cultural program to promote the history and culture of Greece. Thousands of students have visited under the AHEPA banner since its inception. After a few lean years, the AHEPA program was reinvigorated by Past Supreme President Dr. James F. Dimitriou. Relaunched in 2005, the program has transferred credit to 63 universities from students coming from 28 states & Canada.

The 2010 AHEPA Journey to Greece Program has continued the tradition of providing a vigorous educational program amid the cultural beauty of Greece.

Already, our students have received detailed policy briefings from the U.S. Embassy by Ambassador Daniel Speckhard and the Hellenic Ministry of Foreign Affairs. A class session devoted to U.S.-Greece relations followed the briefings.

In addition, the prominent ELIAMP Think Tank provided the students with a thorough lecture on the state of the Greek economy. The students were taken on a private tour of the Hellenic Parliament as well as the Gallery historical collection. Greek AHEPA HJ 1 chapter hosted a welcome night reception and a visit to the Battle-ship Averoff awaits.

Visits to Historical Sites Compliment Educational Sessions The Journey to Greece Program is divided in two sessions that covers seven weeks in total. The first session began July 5, 2010. A generous grant from the National Hellenic Society as a major supporter of



the AHEPA Journey to Greece has funded a five-day cruise which will take place in between the two programs for the students. The cruise visits many historical sites with educational elements brought forth in the classroom.

Our student blog is going well and posted daily, both events and photos daily with wide circulation thanks to the donation of an internship from Hellenext: The Next Generation.

Professor Stephen Miller took the students on a personal tour of his excavations at the famous Nemean Site. Captain Evangelos Rigos had arranged to take our students on a personal tour of ancient Corinth and students will continue on to the ancient Olympian site.

Joseph J. Skarzenski, a frequent contributor to the Journey to Greece blog writes: "...Even after being part of the Journey program for three years, it was very difficult for me to say good-bye. While we may have traveled together to Athens as strangers or mere acquaintances, we part ways from one another as the closest of friends, or what I like to call the "Journey family." This year was no exception

It really is hard for me to accept this change is lifestyle and go back to my "American" life. While many might think of the historic sites, shops, and vivid nightlife when Greece is mentioned, I think of my "Journey family." I think of going to a kafenio with other students in between classes, sharing stories about back home while relaxing in the apartments, or my personal favorite: comparing the "Grenglish" our pappous and yiayias use back in the States. From singa-longs on weekend excursions to eating homemade rizogalo, this 2010 Journey is unique like all the rest. We all have vivid stories from spontaneous events that we will share with excitement when people back home ask: "how was Greece?" These are just a few reasons why it's so hard to realize this is the end of this year's Journey to Greece Program. In my personal experience with saying good-bye to those on the Journey, I feel like the most I can do is continue these lifelong friendships by staying in contact with fellow students and having their presence live on through the stories I tell about my time in Greece."

## Petition the Port Authority to Rebuild Ground Zero Church

WASHINGTON - The leading membership-based association for the nation's three million American citizens of Greek heritage, and Philhellenes, the American Hellenic Educational Progressive Association (AHEPA), has launched a web page dedicated to the effort to cut nine years of bureaucratic red tape and to help augment the community's voice in support of the cause to rebuild St. Nicholas Greek Orthodox Church at Ground Zero, announced National President Nicholas A. Karacostas.

"The Greek American community is displeased and angered that Port Authority officials have declared that a deal to rebuild St. Nicholas is dead," Karacostas said. "We view the church to be of national significance given the circumstances of its fate; a fate that has all but been forgotten by officials. We urge the Port Authority to honor its commitment to the congregation of St. Nicholas and resume negotiations to rebuild the church at its rightful place at Ground Zero."

Karacostas expressed the organization's disappointment in a letter sent August 18, 2010 to Mr. Christopher Ward, executive director, Port Authority of New York and New Jersey. He added AHEPA will not tolerate additional bureaucratic stall tactics in the effort to rebuild the church, which has served the community at large since 1922

The web page, www.ahepa.org/CutTheRedTape, allows visitors to sign an online petition to the Port Authority of New York and New Jersey that calls on the port authority to remove any bureaucratic road-blocks in the reconstruction of the church which was destroyed on September 11, 2001. In addition, the web page allows the visitor to download a "Cut the Red Tape" tool kit that assists with community mobilization. "We encourage everyone to add their voice to urge the port authority to remove its bureaucratic roadblocks and to support of rebuilding St. Nicholas by resuming negotiations with the appropriate representatives of the church," Karacostas said. "Let's send a strong message that the community stands for principle and for what is right,

and it will not tolerate failure to honor one's commitment."

"The Greek American community is displeased and angered that Port Authority officials have declared that a deal to rebuild St. Nicholas is dead," Karacostas said. "We view the church to be of national significance given the circumstances of its fate; a fate that has all but been forgotten by officials. We urge the Port Authority to honor its commitment



to the congregation of St. Nicholas and resume negotiations to rebuild the church at its rightful place at Ground Zero."


The 5th District Lodge has supported the signature collection effort by circulating the petition on their visitation. In addition, the signatures were collected on the Asbury Park boardwalk at the Holy Cross Celebration on September 19th. If you have not yet done so, please visit the AHEPA national web site www.ahepa.org and click on the "Cut the Red Tape" link to be counted in the petition campaign.

Assisting to draw attention to this issue has been the work of AHE-PA Headquarters who issued the press release quoting SP Karacostas. It was picked up by much of the print media. Articles appeared in the New York Post on 9/30 and the Newark Star Ledger. A TV report also appeared on Fox News.

Another regular contributor has been Hudson 108 President Christos Genes who has written a letter to the Editor and was quoted on the air by many of the New York TV media. Hudson 108 is chartered in Jersey City, directly across the Hudson River from Ground Zero.

Swearing in of Congressman Payne a Continuation in a Long Line Of AHEPA Members in Congress

"For years, before the Greek community even knew of Congressman Payne, he was one of our staunchest supporters. 




